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Office of Interoperable Communications (OIEC) announced a Statewide Interoperable Communications Grant, allocating funding to counties to aid in making necessary improvements and providing for sustainment of Land Mobile Radio Systems (LMR), and

WHEREAS, through this new grant program, the Tompkins County Department of Emergency Response has been awarded funding for the maintenance of LMR components supporting interoperability in the form of reimbursement for eligible program expenses, and

WHEREAS, Tompkins County has since been notified that various recurring expenses for the maintenance and replacement of the Department’s interoperable radio communications system are eligible for reimbursement beginning in 2017, and

WHEREAS, the Tompkins County Legislature, in anticipation of the planned funding has through the recently adopted 2018 Budget and Capital Program anticipated such reimbursement and established appropriate budgetary mechanisms to execute the grant on a recurring, annual basis, and will now be reimbursed for current year’s systems costs, and

WHEREAS, the Tompkins County Legislature desires that such new sources of funding be directed toward anticipated communications systems replacements and future enhancements, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, on recommendation of the Public Safety and the Budget, Capital and Personnel Committees, That Tompkins County accepts an award of \$738,565 (DHSES Award WM16198674), to fund sustainment, maintenance, and enhancement of the interoperable communications system,

### Report from County Administration

Ms. Younger reported on communication she has had with LaBella Associates and said they are approaching the work in three phases. A document showing proposed new program space was distributed to the Committee. She said Phase I takes into account all of the space that is available along with the space projected to be needed and confirming with the Sheriff, Undersheriff, and Captain Bunce, how the space could be best allocated. Once that is confirmed they will move into Phase II where there would be sketches to review that would serve as a graphic for how space would be laid out. A conference call took place this morning with the Sheriff, Undersheriff, Captain Bunce, Arel LeMaro, Mark Kukuvka, and Amy Daley to discuss the results of the first phase.

Ms. Younger said an extensive walk-thru of the Jail took place this morning of the entire building including the Jail, Road Patrol, and storage areas. She distributed a document showing the amount of space that would be needed to enhance the alternative-to-incarceration programs and said currently the best estimate of program and support space needed is 1,176. She said discussion of the program piece is going to need to be held at the CJA/ATI Board's January meeting and this will delay the second Phase. Ms. Younger distributed a preliminary list of proposed new program space that would be housed at the facility.

Mr. LeMaro said assuming it would be an independent building there is approximately 16,000 gross sq. ft. needed for the Civil, Investigation, Road Patrol, and Sheriff's Administration. The amount of existing space those programs currently occupy was not available at this time. Ms. Robertson stated a comprehensive list of programs and space is needed. Mr. Bunce noted the purpose of the document is to discuss the programs and to make sure that the space that is designed for the facility or programs is provided for.

In response to Ms. Kelles, Sheriff Lansing said it is his hope to move Road Patrol, Civil, and Administration out of the building, which will free up space.

Mr. John stressed the importance in making sure CJA/ATI members are prepared to discuss this at their next meeting.

Ms. Buechel expressed concern that there be enough space for large group programming and suggested BOCES and Mental Health could share space. She also suggested adding a third or fourth medical room. Ms. Robertson agreed with Ms. Buechel and said thought should be given to the amount of space that would be ideal for programming. Sheriff Lansing clarified that the space currently under discussion is in addition to what currently exists.

Mr. LeMaro shared Ms. Buechel's concern that there be more space for programming and said he has asked Mr. Kukuvka to provide the Committee with additional information along with an initial draft of the space layout at the next meeting. That information would show what Labella initially proposed in 2002 and what is currently being proposed. He also said Mr. Kukuvka will be attending the CJA/ATI meeting.

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Mr. Dennis was excused at this time.

### **Committee Structure**

Mr. John said he thinks the time has come to fold this Committee's work into the Public Safety Committee and asked for input from the Committee. Members were supportive of this as long as it does not impact time or attention to other Public Safety programs and with the understanding that there may be a need for additional meetings as the design process moves forward.

### **How do we Measure the Effectiveness of ATI's**

Mr. John said there is a very clear budget for the Jail and one can compare the operational expense of running the Jail. From a financial standpoint and as part of measuring success the Legislature needs to define some boundaries around what is an alternative-to-incarceration (ATI) program, who is participating in an ATI program, and how to allocate expense to it. He said at this time the Legislature does not have a good idea of what those boundaries are and he also doesn't think it can be done perfectly or to everyone's satisfaction.

Mr. John gave an example of electronic monitoring, which is clearly an ATI program; however, an effective youth services program can have tremendous impacts as it diverts kids to pathways other than criminal justice. Another example is the Assigned Counsel Program but stated the Counsel at First Arraignment is specifically tasked to address jail population. There is a lot to think about but he thinks the Committee should have a discussion of what and how to measure the effectiveness of programs.

Ms. Kelles said outside of its impact on the Jail each program has its own program goals and outcomes and suggested the Committee obtain and review a list of what programs exist that is considered ATI programs.

Ms. Robertson said the global measurement is Jail population and within that there is recidivism and would like to know how many individuals have been incarcerated in the Jail more than once. Mr. John responded that if the County was reducing recidivism it would be winning but questions how the individual pieces would be measured to show the effectiveness of each of the individual programs. Ms. Buechel said first recidivism needs to be defined.

Ms. Robertson recalled when the Legislature first included a significant amount of funding in its budget for ATI programs and said early childhood education was included but she is unclear if that is captured now.

Mr. John said reducing recidivism will tell the County whether it is winning but would like there to be some metrics developed to see what is producing that effect. Mr. McKenna said data needs to be gathered to provide a means of comparison and he is interested in learning what the cost is of all programs per inmate. Ms. Younger said there are sources at the national level where a set of measures already exist and that could serve as a guideline.

Ms. Robertson referred to a two-part report done by Deana Bodnar of the Department of Social Services approximately ten years ago that was an evaluation of Misdemeanor and Felony Drug Courts, Family Treatment Court, and other ATI programs, and suggested it be used as a starting point.

Ms. Kelles spoke of the many variables associated with evaluating programs and noted there are



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some that are more expensive but provide a great benefit to the community. She said instead of trying to identify everything she would like to develop a list that is manageable and realistic. Ms. Buechel noted the Program Impact Statements that are submitted during the budget process have metrics on them.

Mr. John described how an estimate of what it costs to incarcerate a person at the Jail per day could be used as a starting point.

Ms. Kelles said there are many benefits other than monetary and wants to see that the full conversation takes place and captures that information. Ms. Robertson said the focus without variances is lowering the population and keeping board out costs down at \$85/day but that doesn't include other things such as transportation, medical, and other costs.

Mr. John noted that the cost of keeping someone at the local Jail could be higher than boarding out but that doesn't mean the preference would be to board out. He said it will be difficult to determine what to measure in the ATI programs but the Committee needs to take a look at it.

Mr. Bunce announced the Sheriff has partnered with CARS (Cayuga Addiction Recovery Service) and is doing a Vivitrol program out of the Jail that began four weeks ago. He said there has already been a patient and benefit from it.

He also reported the Department has made arrangements to have double bunks removed by the Facilities Department. The Commission of Correction requires that they be removed by January 10th. They will be stored on site and can be used in the future if needed. A second Jail Nurse position was approved in the 2018 budget and an offer was extended and accepted today. Also, a Social Worker for the Jail has been hired and is ready to begin in mid-January.

Sheriff Lansing said Commissioner of Correction Riley came and visited the facility and said he understands Tompkins County's position as he was a Sheriff previously and was trying to do similar things with his facility. Mr. Lansing said he found this very encouraging.

## Public Safety Committee Report –December 2017

### Section 1.01 Department Activities:

- December 2<sup>nd</sup>- Sheriff Lansing attended the bowling event to raise money for the Cops, Kids and Toys program.
- December 4<sup>th</sup>- Stakeholders met to discuss the new Raise the Age Legislation.
- December 5<sup>th</sup>- Sheriff Lansing and other essential personnel met with the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee. Members of the Corrections Division went to pick up the department van up from the BOCES program. They had been working to fix the van and make it more efficient for the department.
- December 6<sup>th</sup>- Captain Bunce attended the normally scheduled CJATI meeting. Additionally, the Ithaca High School Government class toured the jail facility. Lastly, Sheriff Lansing attended the Traffic Safety Committee meeting in Albany.
- December 8<sup>th</sup>- Several members of the Sheriff's Office attended the Groton Fire Department's 50-year celebration.
- December 10<sup>th</sup>- Sheriff Lansing accepted toy donations for Cops, Kids and Toys from the Newfield Methodist Church.
- December 12<sup>th</sup>- The Sheriff's Office conducted K-9 policy training. Additionally, Administration attended the Workforce, Diversity and Inclusion Committee meeting to discuss jail operation policy.
- December 14<sup>th</sup>- Cayuga Radio Group spoke with Sheriff Lansing regarding the Cops, Kids and Toys program in Tompkins County. The Corrections Division took part in a Defensive Tactics demo.
- December 18<sup>th</sup>- Members of TCSO attended the Kiwanis awards to honor Investigator Rick Haas.

- December 19<sup>th</sup>- Cops, Kids and Toys delivery day.
- December 20<sup>th</sup>- The Road Patrol Sergeants had their regularly scheduled meeting. Additionally, the Criminal Justice Coordinator Interview Team met.
- December 21<sup>st</sup>- The Corrections Division Sergeants had their regularly scheduled meeting. Administration phone conferenced with LaBella Associates to discuss the blueprint options for the TCSO location. Lastly, the Corrections Division conducted interviews for the vacant RN position.
- December 22<sup>nd</sup>- The Sheriff's Office held their 1<sup>st</sup> Annual "Ugly Sweater Party".
- December 27<sup>th</sup>- Sheriff Lansing met with program leaders regarding a new PTSD grant opportunity.

### *Section 1.02 Sheriff's Office Media Releases*

- **Larceny Arrest- December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017**
  - On December 1st, 2017 at about 6:00 PM, deputies responded to an address on Warren Road in the Town of Ithaca for a stolen cell phone report. Subsequent to an investigation, deputies recovered the stolen cell phone from a male suspect. Deputies identified the male as LEE R AVERY (age 36 of Ithaca).
  - AVERY was charged with Petit Larceny and Criminal Possession of Stolen Property 5th Degree. AVERY posted Police Bail and was released on an appearance ticket. He is set to appear in the Town of Ithaca Court on December 14th at 9:30 AM.
- **Drug Arrest- December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017**
  - On December 1st, 2017 at about 8:25 PM, deputies stopped a blue Honda on State Route 13 near Warren Road in the Village of Lansing for speeding. Subsequent to an investigation, deputies identified the driver as JOSEPH A HURBAN (Age 36 of Ithaca). HURBAN held a suspended driver's license and was found to be in possession of two bags of a white powdery substance and a small quantity of marijuana.
  - HURBAN was charged with Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 5th Degree (D Felony), Aggravated Unlicensed Operation of a Motor Vehicle 3rd Degree (U Misd.), and Unlawful Possession of Marijuana (Violation). He is set to appear in the Town of Lansing Court on January 9th, 2018 at 9:00 AM.

- **Petit Larceny- December 9<sup>th</sup>, 2017**
  - On December 9th, 2017 at 4:18 PM, Tompkins County Sheriff's deputies responded to Target located at 40 Catherwood Road, Village of Lansing for a theft complaint. Deputies interviewed Target Lost Prevention upon arrival. Lost prevention alleged observing a female, identified as AMANDA R. GIROUX, age 28 of Dryden, NY, stealing merchandise from the store and exiting by all points of sale. Deputies arrested GIROUX who was charged with Petit Larceny (Class A Misdemeanor). GIROUX was issued an appearance ticket and released ordering her to return at a later date for her initial appearance.
  
- **Petit Larceny Arrest- December 9<sup>th</sup>, 2017**
  - On December 9th, 2017 at 5:40 PM, Tompkins County Sheriff's Deputies responded to Target, 40 Catherwood Road in the Village of Lansing for a theft complaint. Deputies interviewed lost prevention upon arrival who allege observing a female identified as ITATI A. ABADIE, age 19 of Jackson Heights, NY stealing merchandise from their store. They then allege observing walking out with the merchandise passing all points of sale making no attempt to purchase it. ABADIE was arrested and charged with Petit Larceny (Class A Misdemeanor) and Unlawful Possession of Marihuana (Violation). She was released on appearance ticket ordering her to return to the Town of Lansing Court at a later date.
  
- **Petit Larceny Arrest- December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2017**
  - On December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at around 3:33 PM, Tompkins County Sheriff's Deputies responded to Target, 40 Catherwood in the Village of Lansing for a theft complaint. Deputies interviewed lost prevention upon arrival who allege observing two females and one male steal merchandise from their store. Lost prevention further allege that when they confronted the three, the incident became physical when they forced their way through lost prevention officers.
  - After an investigation into the case, deputies located and charged three individuals. NICOLE B. SHERMAN, age 27 of Dublin Road in Lansing and two other individuals who are under the age of 18 were arrested and charged with one count each of Petit Larceny (Class A Misdemeanor). They were all three given appearance tickets and ordered to return to the Town of Lansing Court at a later date.
  
- **Narcotics Arrest- December 10, 2017**
  - On December 10<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at 9:00 PM, Tompkins County Sheriff's Deputies responded to 1321 Dryden Road in the Town of Dryden for a drug complaint. Deputies interviewed ARTHUR F. HAYES, age 38 of Trumansburg, N.Y. upon arrival. During the course of the investigation, deputies located marihuana, crack cocaine, heroin and a hypodermic syringe on HAYES.

- HAYES was arrested and charged with Criminally Possessing a Hypodermic Instrument (Class A Misdemeanor), two counts of Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance in the Seventh Degree (Class A Misdemeanor) and Unlawful Possession of Marihuana (Violation). Hayes was issued appearance tickets ordering him to return to the Town of Dryden Court on January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2018 at 5:00 PM.

- **Credit Card Skimmers Community Advisory- December 13<sup>th</sup>, 2017**

- The Tompkins County Sheriff's Office would like the public to be aware of the current credit card scams that are taking place at local gas stations around the area. These scams are occurring through what are called "credit card skimmers". These devices are installed and used to read the credit card number and log it for use at a later date.
- Sheriff Lansing recommends a couple tricks and tips to help prevent this type of credit card theft:
  - 1) Smartphone users can utilize their Bluetooth to catch a "credit card skimmer". If a long series of numbers appears on the list of recognized Bluetooth connections on your device, it is likely that there is a "skimmer" on the pump. By enabling Bluetooth you are able to pick up the signal the "skimmer" is sending. If you see a number like this, go in to the establishment and inform the gas attendant immediately. Additionally, Android users have applications available to be able to detect skimmers; such as "Skimmer Scanner" by SparkX. This app uses the Bluetooth footprint to recognize if there is a "skimmer" on the gas pump.
  - 2) Another way to avoid theft is going into the establishment and paying directly. Whether you are paying with a card or cash, you can always pay inside the building. This is the safest method.
  - "It is easy to fall prey to this kind of theft; take the extra precaution and double check your surroundings with these suggestions", says Sheriff Lansing.

- **Petit Larceny- December 13<sup>th</sup>, 2017**
